QUERY RESPONSES

"For me the peace testimony is grounded in the conviction that peace is a moral imperative honoring our shared humanity. At its core, the peace testimony asks us in our relationships with each other, our family, our community – and even ourselves - to openheartedly practice listening, respect, and empathy as the foundation of non-conflict and peace. STUDENT PEACE AWARDS

Peacemaking is vital in our world, and students active in the pursuit of peace should be encouraged in every way possible. Herndon Friends Meeting and Herndon High School began The Student Peace Awards of Fairfax County in 2006 to encourage everyone to think more about peace as both a means and an end, and to recognize young people who work as peacemakers. In 2013, for the first time, it was offered to every public high school in Fairfax County. Two private schools are also included. Every year, the high schools in Fairfax County are asked to select one junior or senior, or a group of students, whose work has promoted peace. The project is organized by volunteers and funded by donations from 19 secular and religious sponsoring organizations.

This year we celebrate the efforts of 27 award winners, 23 individuals and 4 groups, from 27 participating schools in Fairfax County. The sponsors, family, and friends will celebrate their accomplishments at a reception on March 19 at the Sherwood Community Center in Fairfax, Va. The award consists of a monetary gift for each recipient and for a peace-focused charity of his or her choice, and a framed certificate, generally presented at each participating school's annual awards ceremony. Communication and Outreach:

Herndon Friends new website is currently under construction and should be online within the next few weeks.

Peace and Social Concerns:

The FCNL conducted a successful zoom lobby visit on 2/22/23 with legislative correspondents from Senator Kaine and Senator Warner's offices. Mary gave a brief overview of the current ASK for this year: increase funding to 3 peacebuilding funds: Complex Crises Fund, Atrocities Prevention, Reconciliation Programs. Friends are asked to watch for notices via our listsery on how they may contact Congress to request increased funding. Forms and instructions will also be available on Herndon Friends website.

The Committee is considering how to best create and disburse "household kits" to local Shelter House. Instructions to Friends will be forthcoming.

A dividend disbursement committee with members from this committee and Ministry and Oversight are discussing how we wish to disburse our dividends to local organizations which reflect our values. In light of the history of our building as a segregated library: how might we contribute reparations to the Herndon community? How would we do that? Meg Wallace, Meeting Clerk, commented that this seems like an appropriate question for the Anti-Racist Work Group. We look forward to that group considering this and bringing back suggestions to us at some time in the future.
